Damon's honor. Life was sweet to Pythias but his friend's unblemished honor was sweeter.

No Self-centred Thought

"Had Damon or Pythias for one moment entertained a self-centred thought, Pythias would have died twice in body and soul, Damon would have died in his soul when the realization of the hideousness of his unfaithfulness had come and Dionysius, the evil king, would never have been won and changed. It is to be noted that the friendship of Jesus and Judas was violated the moment Judas entertained one selfish thought about the thirty pieces of silver and King Saul broke friendship with David the moment he entertained one self-centred, jealous thought about David's popularity. Let us be forewarned friendship and selfishness are deadly enemies."

The two minor parts in the story, Mr. Brown pointed out, were played by Dionysius and Damon's servant. Dionysius tried his best to tempt Pythias to escape from the dungeon where he was held hostage for the condemned Damon. He was here the prototype of Satan, purposely tempting men to sin and dishonor. Rev. Mr. Brown observed that not all temptation to evil comes from within. Companions, circumstances, forces from without played their cruel part.

"It is to be soberly recalled," the speaker said, "that Christ's greatest curse fell upon him who would cause another to stumble," and added: "The first to offer a boy a drink, the first to tease or suggest to a girl, vice of any kind, the first to tempt a good man to sharp practice in business or social relationships are among the thus accursed. 'Our principal danger, however,' is from within ourselves," the preacher continued, "from our inherent tendency to evil, selfishness and weakness of will. Sin takes place in the wills of men and there it must be fought and conquered. But here our own strength is not enough. We need the power of sanctification which God's Holy Spirit alone supplies."
