The death is announced of James Addison, of Goderich, aged 71. De-ceased was born in Portsmouth, Eng-land, on the 6th of Sept., 1823, and came with his parents to Canada in 1829, first residing at Ottawa, then Brown.—In 1837, he came to Goderich and carried on a shoe busi-ness for some years, and in 1840 en-tered the sheriff's office as bailiff. He was afterwards appointed court erier, and in addition occupied various positions of trust under the Dominion Government. He was a member of Maitham Lodge and Hiram Chapter A. F. & M. His aged partner and nine children—five sons and four daughters—survive him.
